Activity report of BWF

Borderless Word Foundation (BWF) is performing a myriad of activities every year in order to give its inmates more and more opportunities to progress on the mental, social and moral fronts so that they are empowered to live a life with dignity.

In order to achieve our target we together strive hard taking together all as a team. 2014 was declared as a year of hard work as the targets were many and big. The year was declared to give the organisation a new direction as the projects to be initiated were major ones.

We kick started our year with a major event titled "Magic in Kashmir". This was a magic event by a US resident Ryan Bart who came to India to participate in annual meeting of conglomerate of NGO's –the Caring Friends of which BWF is a member. We were successful to invite Mr. Ryan Bart to Kashmir and perform in front of our children in Beerwah and Kupwara. The speciality of the event was that for the first time BWF invited children from Government Schools in this Mega event and conducted the event in DIET Beerwah –the apex educational education of teacher trainings. The show included children from BWF Beerwa, Kupwara, Anantnag and Jammu and all the members of BWF

Mr. Ryan Bart performed the magic show in two sessions giving children entertainment and an understanding of the magic with science.

The organisation then started working on one of the biggest project of starting work on Construction of our own home for children at Beerwah for which the land, plan and many other basics are ready. While we were working to start the mega initiative, something unfortunate took place which shook the basic fabric of this heaven the Kashmir- the Natural disaster of FLOODS that devastated whole of the valley and everyone in the country. This was a natural calamity which destroyed the basic economic fibre of Kashmir and the life was shaken. No doubt the Children in ours project homes remained safe but we were forced to settle the children in different places for some time which in turn affected their studies and also placed us all under stress.



This was for the first time when whole team of BWF felt the dire need of our own homes at all the four places which then plays a pivotal role in the safety of children making their future more bright and secure.

As the floods started receding, our vision opened and we felt the need to expand the field of our work and move towards the rehabilitation work in Kashmir. After taking various needs and demands in to consideration we decided to step forward and start medical relief in the flood ridden areas. Our call became nature's call and the people from Maharashtra flooded to Kashmir in the form of volunteer Doctors in the batches of 20 totalling 80, we got 5 Ambulances with which we started the medical relief work in flood hit areas of Bandipora, Beerwah, Pattan, Baramullah, Anantnag and Srinagar making Beerwah the head quarter of all the activity.

The services have been provided to 3.5 lac people distributing medicine costing 3.7 crore till date. The services to continued till the end of December 2014.

Since we had a thought in past that we must try to start Emergency Medical Services in Kashmir seems to take shape. This type of service is not available here and we can be the first organisation to start such a service here and for the same some permanent infra structure may be needed in the form of Ambulances and other medical equipment for which we need the support of our well wishers.

In addition to medical relief we were successful to help people with some more, although little, items of the need in the form of 300 solar lamps and 10,000 blankets.

In practice we need a lot of solar lamps and blankets as the winter is the biggest challenge the flood hit displaced people are facing, we have analysed the situation and felt that items such as blankets, solar lamps, sweaters and jackets can serve the needs of these flood displaced and victimised people to a good extent.



One of the major work we took in hand is the rehabilitation of 300 flood hit families in the Bandipora district who have lost their only bread earning carpet weaving loom and are still idle. We are planning to start their rehabilitation by providing them the carpet weaving looms to each family so that they start the work again and can benefit from the same for long.

Providing one more opportunity to start their studies, we are also working to provide note books to almost the school going children of 26 villages in Baramulla and Bandipora district, who lost their books and note books in the floods. Mean while our children have played an important role by becoming part of all these activities. They have played the role by helping the volunteer doctors as translators and also helping their stay, food and other facilities.

May it be known to all that floods have shaken our basic infrastructure in Kashmir and it will take long to rehabilitate every one and reshape Kashmir but to our organisation the floods gave a shock as our work to start the construction of home in Beerwah was altogether stopped and we were forced divert all our attention to rehabilitation work in the valley.

Our work is going on and we are committed to work progressively to achieve our targets. Our field of activity is now expanded and we need to have more strength in our manpower and economic zones and we believe that the well wishers who helped us to travel the road to this point , will in the future help us to have the strength and work for the One Great Human Cause.

“September 2014 Floods: A Report on Relief and Rehabilitation in Kashmir Valley”

The Episode of September 2014 Deluge:

One does not need to emphasize that the September floods in Kashmir have overwhelmed us at large, as individuals and as a community. The severity and the magnitude of these floods remain unprecedented in the modern history of Kashmir, and the collective memory of its people. Perhaps this may explain our unpreparedness to it and with it our slow response and rehabilitation in aftermath.

According to the government assessment, the state is estimated to have suffered the losses of at least Rs 1 trillion. The estimates made by civil society groups suggest that the business community have suffered cumulative loss of Rs 35000 crore, which includes Rs 25000 crore losses to infrastructure and stocks besides Rs 10000 crore business losses. Moreover, the government assessment also records that 250,000 houses were fully or severely damaged, crops worth 5600 crore were damaged, 40,000 domestic animals (cows, sheep, horses etc) were killed and 6000 kms of road was damaged or washed away by the floods.

The whole State of Jammu & Kashmir was in one way or the other affected by the deadly floods which also claimed more than 200 lives across the State. Entire population was left at the mercy of Almighty because there was no sign of the State Government during this time of crisis. People had to rescue the trapped ones on their own. Civil Secretariat, Divisional Commissioner Office, Inspector General of Police Office, Armed Police Control Room, Fire & Emergency Services Headquarters Government Hospitals, Private Hospitals were all submerged in flood waters which was approximately 14 feet high at various places.



The absence of Civil Administration further aggravated the situations caused by the deadly floods. This is where the non-government and non-profit organizations came to the rescue of people. The non-government and non-profit organizations working in different areas started the rescue, relief and rehabilitation of the affected population. Moreover, the Local Mohalla {Community} Committees (Welfare Committees) also started the relief operations; some of which lasted for two months.

Relief & Rehabilitation Activities of Borderless World Foundation

Borderless World Foundation (BWF), working for the welfare of conflict affected children and families in Kashmir Valley since 2002 also came in the forefront during the time of floods. The on ground team of BWF surveyed the villages of North, South and Central Kashmir in order to assess the damages caused by the deadly floods. During the survey, it was also found that many families District Baramulla, Bandipora and Budgam had lost their livelihood as their units of Carpet Weaving (Looms) were severely damaged. Therefore, in this regard, BWF decided to provide Carpet Weaving Looms to the affected families which meant giving them a new ray of hope to sustain their lives. The on ground team of BWF started its relief operations under three heads;

- Providing Emergency Medical Care/ Attention,
- Making Clean Drinking Water available, and
- Rehabilitation of Carpet Weavers Community

Borderless World Foundation Team took the services of 80 Doctors from Nasik, Maharashtra in order to conduct medical camps at various locations of the Valley. The team of Doctors was evenly divided in 10 Groups; each group comprising of 8 Doctors. 10 Ambulances were brought from Pune, Maharashtra for the purpose. A total of 170 Medical/ Health Check up camps were conducted and the Team reached to 135,000 flood victims across Baramulla, Budgam, Bandipora, Srinagar and Kupwara Districts, wherein medicines worth Rs 1.5 crore were also provided; which included Chlorine tablets as well, in the 170 medical camps. Moreover, 3600 low cist blankets were also distributed among the flood affected population in the above mentioned districts. BWF also distributed 25750 Note Books (including pencils and other stationary items) to the affected Children of District Baramulla and Bandipora. The cost of the distributed Note Books was Rs 10, Rs 15 and Rs 20 respectively.

BWF also provided 400 Solar Lights across the Valley, 500 frock suits, 400 chappals/ slippers to the affected population. Moreover, 100 warm jackets were also provided to the flood affected people in Beerwah, Budgam.

It was also observed during the survey conducted in Carpet Weavers Community of District Baramulla, Bandipora and Budgam by the on ground team of BWF that many families had lost their livelihood units to the deadly floods. Their main source of income i.e. the Carpet Weaving Looms were severely damaged by the floods and in this regard BWF decided to provide entirely new looms to the affected families; which meant giving them a ray of hope to sustain their lives. In this regard, BWF provided 41 Carpet Weaving Looms to the affected families in District Baramulla, Bandipora and Budgam. The overall focus of BWF's Flood Response Project was "Build Stronger Communities".

The flavor was added to the festival of color when children made beautiful Rangoli's and special dishes were prepared by cooks for kids.

The school level quiz competition happened in March and Muskan from Jammu Home bagged 2nd prize in that and was awarded with Medal and Certificate. Following this the Kanyapoojan festival was celebrated in home. All the children used to wait for this festival because they get to eat only sweets in all three meals which remains excitement for all the kids as sweets are there than what else kids need.

Along with studies BWF believes that recreation facilities are very important for complete growth of child. In this regard Borderless world Foundation organized a Jammu to Goa educational Tour for FAH Home in April, 2014.

The tour was of 20 days, in which kids stay at Delhi for one day where they explored the knowledge about Rashtrapatti Bhawan and Lotus temple. Then from Delhi they were taken to Mumbai for 2 days where beaches and Essel worlds was shown to them which turned to be the happiest moment for all of them. Later from Mumbai, they were taken to Goa. Many activities were carried out in Goa for continuous 10 days. From Goa a trip to Kholapur was made for two days.

In Kohlapur, kids got the opportunity to see Ancient temples and got to know about their historical importance. Moreover, all children went to meet Shahu Maharaja. From Kohlapur, children were taken to Pune. The whole trip remained the learning process for all the kids with a bundle of great experiences and memories.

Project BET-Anantnag

With the coming of a new year, it was a new beginning in the lives of the Children putting up in Anantnag Basera-e-Tabassum Home. The Children welcomed the year with the mission/ objective to get the maximum out of it. The Children of Higher Classes wished to make the coming year successful by passing their respective classes with flying colors. Therefore, the New Year resolution for the year 2014 was to make it a year of wishes, objectives and success.

The Children putting up in Basera-e-Tabassum Home Anantnag resumed their regular class work after a long winter vacation break of nearly 3 months, during the period of which

many Children stayed in their parents' homes for more than one month; while others came back when the schools were about to resume functioning. The Manager and House Mother conducted various extra-curricular activities for the Children staying in B-e-T



Home; like Drawing Competitions, Outdoor and Indoor Games etc. during the winter season for the Children; however, the regular Religious Education as well as Tuition Classes continued on regular basis. Immediately after the opening of the schools, the yearly Unit One tests were scheduled and the Children once again got busy with their studies. Evening Tests became a normal routine with the Manager Ms. Princy taking regular tests and helping out the average children in their studies. During the phase of examination which lasted for around 3 weeks, no extra-curricular activities were conducted as the Children took more interest in their studies. It was exactly after 3 weeks that the results for the Unit One were declared and all the Children; except a few had passed the U-1 examinations with flying colors. It was really an achievement for the Children as well as the other Staff of Basera-e-Tabassum Anantnag for passing the U-1 examinations paving a way for a strong foundation for future examinations in the classes.

The exams were over till April 2014 and the special activities within the B-e-T Home Anantnag took a pace with a daily activity in the evening. The Children were divided into few groups and were assigned a few tasks like setting up the Library within the Home for which a number of books (Academic & Non-Academic) were donated by the well wishers of Borderless World Foundation (BWF). The Children enthusiastically set up a Library with around 200 books within the Home which has proved really beneficial for all the Children. These Children have been assigned the duty of managing the Library and are being supervised by the Home Manager. Moreover, other groups interested in painting and drawings were asked to prepare drawings which could be

later displayed on the walls of B-e-T Anantnag. Moreover, the tuitions as well as the Religious Education classes continued normally. The Senior Members of Borderless World Foundation (BWF) including Mr. Sheikh Zahoor (Chairman BWF-JKL), Mr. Adhik (Founder BWF), Mr. Nitin and Mrs. Salima regularly visited the Home in order to get a knowhow of the present activities and tasks undertaken by the Staff as well as the Children.

In between this zeal and enthusiasm, the Term One examinations started which last for around one month. All the Children worked very hard, studied late night and helped each other in the examinations. During the Term One examinations, Home Manager and House Mother take extensive care of the diet, health and hygiene of all the Children so that they appear in the examinations without any obstacles or hindrances. All the Children observed fasts in the Holy Month of Ramadan (Holy Month of Muslims across the World) which is a religious obligation. They studied hard during the Holy Month and extra care was provided to all the Children. Manager B-e-T took regular evening classes, especially for Mathematics and Science because some of the Children are weak in both these subjects and need extra attention from the Teachers as well as Home Manager. The results for the Term One examinations were declared in the last week of July by all the Schools and all the Children had again showed their brilliance in the examinations by passing the exam with good marks (% age). The extra care and attention given by the Teachers as well as Manger also bore results with the average Children scoring more than expected. This once again was an achievement for the Children putting up in B-e-T Anantnag and giving them a sign that they can achieve more in the future. Soon after the results were declared, the Children were taken out for a picnic to a nearby picnic spot in order to relax and enjoy the beautiful summer. All the Children enjoyed the day out and played games like badminton, Kho-Kho, Frisbee etc. and roamed around. The younger ones were very happy and expressed their happiness by singing songs; both Hindi as well as Kashmiri.

The year 2014 was passing really very well until something untoward happened for which no one in the entire State of Jammu & Kashmir was not prepared. There was a huge down-pour since 27th August 2014 which resulted in deadly floods across the State. The floods hit District Anantnag on 5th September 2014 and the main concern for all was the safety of Children. The floods engulfed the entire Kashmir Valley on 7th September 2014 with people left in a lurch. With the grace of Almighty God, Basera-e-Tabassum Home Anantnag was safe as it is located on the 2nd Floor of the building. However, there was no communication with the BWF Seniors and other Home Managers in order to enquire about the safety of Children. It was only after a gap of 10 days that some communication was developed with the BWF Seniors and thanks to Almighty Allah everyone was safe. However, it was really painful to know that the Vehicle of BWF was damaged in the floods. The Schools were almost non-functional for one month and the State Government declared a month off for the Schools. The one month off gave the Children time to focus on the Final Examination approaching in the month of October 2014. Ms. Princy took the entire charge of taking care of Children's education because the Tuition Centres were also non-functional because of the floods. Manager herself took daily classes of all the Children, in which she was also assisted by the Senior Children of B-e-T Home. The schools started again in the month of October 2014 after Eid-ul-Adha which was celebrated without any joy because a number of people were killed in the floods and thousands of structures were damaged. Unfortunately, the State Government came up with a decision of Mass Promotion of all classes except Class 10th and 12th. Therefore, the entire attention shifted on the education of Children studying in 10th and 12th Classes. The Children of Class 10th and 12th were scheduled to appear for examinations in November 2014 and they were busy in their studies. However, the Children of other classes prepared to go in their next classes, but all were disappointed for not appearing in the examinations.



In November 2014, the Children of Class 10th and 12th appeared in the annual examinations; while as the other Children joined their new classes. The first two weeks of November got spent in purchasing uniforms, new books etc. tuition classes were also started soon after the Children joined new classes. By the month of November 2014, the team of Borderless World Foundation got involved in the post floods relief and rehabilitation activities in different parts of Kashmir Valley, for which 127 Doctors arrived in Valley from Nasik Maharashtra. Various Medical Camps were conducted in various parts of District Budgam, Srinagar and Kupwara.

The schools again got closed down in the month of December 2014 for annual 3 month long winter vacation. Few of the Children went back to their parents' homes in order to spend time with their own families. Many Children sat back at B-e-T Home where they got themselves involved in a number of activities like drawings, painting, indoor games etc. as well as watching TV. With the memories of September 2014 floods still afresh in the minds of the affected population, we at B-e-T Anantnag once again welcomed another year 2015 with a lot many things in mind to be achieved this year. During the second week of January 2015, the results of Class 10th and 12th were declared and the Girls from B-e-T Anantnag passed the said examinations with 1st Division, for which they were congratulated by the entire BWF Family. The Girls were kept free to choose any subjects of their choice, which they chose out of their own will. Passing out 10th and 12th Standard examinations was one of the greatest achievements of B-e-T Anantnag till date. We look forward for the bright future of every Girl Child associated with Borderless World Foundation 'one great human family'.





BRIEF STATUS REPORT
Basera-e-Tabassum Beerwah

The second Basera-e-Tabassum (Abode of Smiles); the Home to rehabilitate orphan girl children, and to provide them with shelter, health care and education , was set up in Beerwah, District Budgam in the year 2006 by Borderless World Foundation, a Pune-based non-profit organization working for Children in the State of Jammu & Kashmir.

Earlier this year, the Anti-Smoking Day was celebrated by all the children of Beerwah home. The kids went out in local and adjacent areas, sticking pamphlets and gave a mark of awareness to general masses about smoking hazards.

The state of Jammu and Kashmir got terribly affected by the devastating floods of September 2014 resulting in loss of human lives and property. In the wake of that tragedy, Borderless World Foundation without wasting any time rushed to provide medical relief services to the flood victims of the valley from Basera-e-Tabassum Home Beerwah.

Accordingly, 127 doctors from Pune, Maharashtra along with 10 ambulances were brought for free medical assistance in 7 districts of the valley. The children of Beerwah home show active participation in medical camps by providing assistance to doctors and locals. Moreover, 4.15 cr cost medicines were raised as in kind donation from many corporate hospitals and local contacts of BWF in Pune. 3.87 lacs patients were assisted by the doctors and around 8 lacs rupees were spent by Borderless World Foundation on managing the above given services

Moreover, 5lacs rupees were spent on providing stationary items and reestablishing looms for some severely affected families in District Baramulla.

In addition 3600 blankets and 900 solar lamps were distributed among the effected households across the valley.

Due to September Floods the examinations were postponed to March 2015 and later the newly formed Coalition Government in the State decided to go for mass Promotion of Students. However the examinations of Students of 8th, 10th and 12th Standards were taken as per schedule. Therefore, in the month of March, the Students studying up to 8th Standard joined their new classes. The schools reopened in the first week of March 2015. B-e-T Children were very happy to join new classes as they got new books, note books, uniforms, school bags, shoes, etc.

After such devastating floods, On January, 2015 Borderless World Foundation organized an educational tour for B-e-T Beerwah to Nasik.

The journey started by staying in a school at Nasik where free food, accommodation and specially education was provided to all children. The children were also invited by Motivalla College to attend their Silver Jubilee event. All kids got the opportunity to visit Shuban Water Park and were provided with vocational trainings of chocolate making, embroidery, fabric paint and Mehndhi designing. All the children in B-e-T Homes are from conflict affected families and belong to far flung areas. So, this experience remained learning and adventurous one for all of them where they enjoyed without any barrier to their fullest.

From Nasik, children went to Mumbai and stay at TISS (Tata Institute of Social Sciences), visited many shrines as Haji Ali and Murude Ali bagh for peace of mind, visited CID sets. The chairperson of Mahim Dargah_ Mr. Rizwan presented blankets and clothes to all children. After which one day stay at Goa was conducted where the lovely experience of huge beaches was captured.

The children also visited Kohlapur where one of the donors of BWF presented the famous Kohlapuri Chapals to all the kids. Children from Kashmir are very fond of Apple Orchards but in Baramati, the children visited one of the schools of Agriculture and got to see the huge orchards of Orange, Tamarind and Grapes which was a complete jaw opening movement for them. After Baramati, children went to Jalgaon and visited Jain Irrigation where they saw how solar lights are made, learned about Tissue Culture and got to know the whole biography of Gandhi Ji with picture presentation.

The children also stay at Pune, went to Imagica Water Park where they play games and enjoyed a lot.

On the return, children stay at Jammu for 4 days which was out of the plan as roads got blocked and closed due to heavy landslides. The tour ended successfully wherein children learned new things, experience new places and come up with new ideas and aims for their intellectual growth.



Army has always been in support for B-e-T Beerwah Home. The army general donated 5 fully equipped Computer systems to B-e-T Beerwah. Which are placed in computer library at Beerwah Home and all children effectively use them.



All the elder Children in the Home observed fasts throughout the Holy Month of Ramadan during which the evenings were marked by recitation of The Holy Quran, Naats etc. Moreover, dresses were also purchased for the Children on the auspicious occasion of Eid-ul-Fitr. The Children of B-e-T Home Beerwah celebrated Eid-ul-Fitr in the Home with Zahoor Sir, Mr. Riyaz, Manager Ms. Mehmooda and other Staff Members.

On 12th August 2015, Mr. Bhupendra Mahajan and Mr. Laxmikant Varangaonkar from Mumbai visited B-e-T Beerwah. Both the guests interacted with the Children and felt very happy for getting a chance to meet such amazing children. Zahoor Sir, Ms. Mehmooda, Mr. Riyaz and few teachers were also present. The Children sang group songs **“Hum Bachche Hindustan Ke”** and **“Ye waqt na thehraa hai”** with both the guests. Few children also sang songs which amazed the guests. The guests wished to visit B-e-T Beerwah again when they come to Kashmir.

On 15th August 2015, a Drawing Competition was held in B-e-T Beerwah Home which was conducted by Army. All the Children participated in the Drawing Competition with great zeal and enthusiasm and in the end; prizes were distributed among the winners. There were six winners in total; two from each category; i.e. A, B and C.

Later on 26th August 2015, a Debate Competition for all the B-e-T Homes was held at Srinagar Office wherein Children from Anantnag, Beerwah and Kupwara participated. Children studying in 8th to 10th Standard were asked to Debate on Category B ***“Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao”*** and the Children from 11th Standard onwards were asked to deliberate upon Category A ***“Importance of Women Leadership in Kashmir”***. The event was attended by Mrs. Salima, Mr. Riyaz, Mr. Ghulam Rasool (Mamaji), Ms. Iqra and the proceedings of the event were carried by Mr. Haris Abrar. Later, prizes were distributed among the best speakers. Ms. Sarwar Jan of B-e-T Beerwah got the 2nd Prize in Category A.

In the ending part of August, Mr. Nitin had a photography workshop for the Children of B-e-T Beerwah. Six Children of Beerwah took part in the Photography Workshop organized by STEP wherein they were taught the technicalities of using Camera. Moreover, Mr. Nitin wanted the girls to take up their passion for photography to the next level and take it up as a profession wherein all the possible help would be provided by Mr. Nitin and his associates. The girls were very much amazed to hear about the same.

A free medical camp was organized by BWF at Sub-District _ Beerwah in 10th, October 2015. The camp was sponsored by Health Department and Security force. In the event, all children from B-e-T Beerwah got free medical checkups from the doctors comprised of one General Physician, one Surgeon and one Gynecologist.

BRIEF STATUS REPORT

Basera-e-Tabassum Kupwara

A new year brings a new ray of hope in the lives of every individual and same is the case with the Children putting up in Basera-e-Tabassum Kupwara which is a Home to 50 Orphan Girls from different Districts of Kashmir Valley. The coming of a New Year means that there are a lot of things to be achieved in the year and improving on the mistakes done in the past years which was the New Year resolution of all the Children putting up in Basera-e-Tabassum (B-e-T) Kupwara.

Basera-e-Tabassum Kupwara started in the year 2002 for the welfare of Orphan and marginalized Children continued with its noble cause to provide the basic necessities to the Children for living a decent life and hope for a better future. Therefore, in this regard, a programme was developed the main aim of which was to provide quality education to all the Children for clearing their examinations with flying colors. The Children studying in Higher Classes also took keen interest in addressing the subject related problems of the younger Children.

The Children putting up in Basera-e-Tabassum Home Kupwara resumed their regular class work after a long winter vacation break of nearly 3 months, during the period of which many Children stayed in their parents' homes for more than one month; while others came back when the schools were about to resume functioning.

Moreover, the Children were also helped by the Staff Members in completing the Winter Vacation Assignment assigned by their respective Schools. The Manager and House Mother conducted various extra-curricular activities for the Children staying in B-e-T Home; like Drawing Competitions, Outdoor and Indoor Games etc. during the winter season for the Children; however, the regular Religious Education as well as Tuition Classes continued on regular basis. The Children went to the Madrasa (Religious Education Institution) everyday which is situated outside the B-e-T Home. Other than extra-curricular activities, education was also given a priority and classes other than regular tuition were conducted on regular basis within the Home. The main aim of conducting extra classes and giving more attention to the Children was to make them ready for the coming Unit One examinations immediately after opening of the Schools. Immediately when the schools re-opened after the winter break, the date sheets for the yearly Unit One tests were notified making the Children once again to get busy with their studies. In this regard, daily Evening Tests became a normal routine with the Manager Ms. Ishrat taking regular tests and helping out the Children, especially average children in their studies. During the phase of examination which lasted for around 4 weeks because the Children study in different schools, no extra-curricular activities were conducted as the Children took more interest in their studies. It was exactly after 4 weeks that the results for the Unit One were declared and all the Children; except a few had passed the U-1 examinations with flying colors. The results showed that there is still a scope for improvement in the studies, for which the Children as well as the Staff Members have to work very hard in order to fill the gap. The scope for further improvement means that the Children have to take up their studies seriously and work hard, so that they can build a great career in the future. Mrs. Salima Bhat (Project Coordinator B-e-T Kupwara) in this regard has trained the Staff Members, especially Manager and House Mothers to give proper attention towards the education of the Children and give special care to all Children during their examinations, so that they can study and work hard.

The Unit One examinations as well as the results were over by 15th April 2014 and therefore, the special/ extra-curricular activities within the Home once again started taking pace. All the Children started taking part in the extra-curricular activities which were conducted on every weekend as well as Holidays. The main extra-curricular activities conducted in 2014 include Drawing Competition, Describe Me, Story Telling, Singing, Reading, Mimicry, Musical Chair, Kho-Kho, Quiz, and many more activities. The Children took part in all these activities with great zeal and enthusiasm. Moreover, other day-to-day activities were also conducted like cleaning of the Home in which the elder Children helped out the House Mothers. The Manager supervised all the activities done in the B-e-T Home, for which a detailed report was prepared from time to time. The paintings, drawings and notes prepared by the Children which were displayed on the walls of B-e-T Kupwara. The Senior Members of Borderless World Foundation (BWF) from Pune as well as Kashmir visited B-e-T Kupwara Home on regular basis in order to get a knowhow of the present activities and tasks undertaken by the Staff as well as the Children. Moreover, monthly meetings within the Home were conducted by Mrs. Salima Bhat wherein a detailed report about the activities and tasks performed monthly were discussed and more programs and activities were decided to be conducted with the Children. The Children were also encouraged to take active part in extra-curricular activities as they play an important role in the overall development of an individual.



In between all this zeal, enthusiasm and the Term One examinations commenced which last for around one month. Once again, the Project Coordinator, Manager and other staff members got active to help out the Children in their studies so that they pass the Term Examination with good percentage. All the Children worked very hard, studied late night and helped each other in the examinations. During the Term One examinations, Home Manager and House Mother take extensive care of the diet, health and hygiene of all the Children so that they appear in the examinations without any obstacles or hindrances. The Term Examinations were held during the Holy Month of Ramadan (Holy Month of Muslims across the World) and all the Senior Children of the Home observed fasts which is a religious obligation. Extensive care was taken of all the fasting Children as they all were preparing for the exams during the fasts. Many dishes like firni, halwa, sewain etc. were prepared for opening of the day-long fasts. The Children offered Salah (Namaz) five times a day and recited the Holy Quran during the month of Ramadan. Manager B-e-T took regular evening classes, especially for Mathematics and Science because some of the Children are weak in both these subjects and need extra attention from the Teachers as well as Home Manager. The results for the Term One examinations were declared in the first week of August by all the Schools and all the Children had again showed their brilliance in the examinations by passing the exam with good marks (%age). The extra care and attention given by the Teachers as well as Manger also bore results with the average Children scoring more than expected. This was an achievement for the Children putting up in B-e-T Kupwara and giving them a sign that they can achieve more in the future. Soon after the results were declared, the Children were taken out for a picnic to a nearby picnic spot in order to relax and enjoy the beautiful summer. All the Children enjoyed the day out and played games like badminton, Kho-Kho, Frisbee etc. and roamed



around. The younger ones were very happy and expressed their happiness by singing songs; both Hindi as well as Kashmiri. The Project Coordinator Mrs. Salima Bhat also accompanied the Children for Picnic.

The year 2014 was passing really very well until something very untoward happened for which no one in the entire State of Jammu & Kashmir was not prepared. There was a huge downpour since 27th August 2014 which resulted in deadly floods across the State. The floods engulfed the entire Kashmir Valley on 7th September 2014 with people left in a lurch and the safety of all Children putting up in other two B-e-T Homes was the main concern. With the grace of Almighty God, Basera-e-Tabassum Home Kupwara was safe as the flood waters didn't reach Kupwara. However, there was no communication with the BWF Seniors and other Home Managers in order to enquire about the safety of Children. It was only after a gap of 10 days that some communication was developed with the BWF Seniors and thanks to Almighty Allah everyone was safe. However, it was really painful to know that the Vehicle of BWF was damaged in the floods. The Schools were almost non-functional for one month and the State Government declared a month off for the Schools. The one month off gave the Children time to focus on the Final Examination approaching in the month of October 2014. Ms. Ishrat took the entire charge of taking care of Children's education as well as the Tuition Centres. Manager herself took daily classes of all the Children, in which she was also assisted by the Senior Children of B-e-T Home. The schools started again in the month of October 2014 after Eid-ul-Adha which was celebrated without any joy because a number of people were killed in the floods and thousands of structures were damaged. Unfortunately, the State Government came up with a decision of Mass Promotion of all classes except Class 10th and 12th. Therefore, the entire attention shifted on the education of Children studying in 10th and 12th Classes. The Children of Class 10th and 12th were scheduled to appear for examinations in November 2014 and they were busy in their studies. However, the Children of other classes prepared to go in their next classes, but all were disappointed for not appearing in the examinations.



In November 2014, four Girls from B-e-T Kupwara appeared in the annual Class 10th examinations; while as the other Children joined their new classes. The Girls appearing in the Class 10th examinations were all the time supported in case there was any problem with the subjects. Both Mrs. Salima and Ms. Ishrat were at their disposal in case they faced any problems in their studies. The first two weeks of November got spent in purchasing uniforms, new books etc. Tuition classes were also started soon after the Children joined new classes. By the month of November 2014, the team of Borderless World Foundation got involved in the post floods relief and rehabilitation activities in different parts of Kashmir Valley, for which 127 Doctors arrived in Valley from Nasik Maharashtra. Various Medical Camps were conducted in various parts of District Budgam, Srinagar and Kupwara.

The schools again got closed down in the month of December 2014 for annual 3 month long winter vacation. Few of the Children went back to their parents' homes in order to spend time with their own families. Many Children sat back at B-e-T Home where they got themselves involved in a number of activities like drawings, painting, indoor games etc. as well as watching TV. With the memories of September 2014 floods still afresh in the minds of the affected population, we at B-e-T Kupwara once again welcomed another year 2015 with a lot many things in mind to be achieved this year. During the second week of January 2015, the results of Class 10th were declared and all the four Girls who appeared in the examination from B-e-T Kupwara passed the said examinations with 1st Divisions, for which they were congratulated by the entire BWF Family. The Girls were kept free to choose any subjects of their choice, which they chose out of their own will. All the Girls chose Science Stream for further studies and were immediately sent to Coaching Centres for Class 11th. Clearing Class 10th examinations was one of the greatest achievements of B-e-T Kupwara till date. We look forward for the bright future of every Girl Child associated with Borderless World Foundation 'one great human family'.
