In the northern reaches of Kashmir, Rabia Gul, a diligent 12th-grade student at Borderless World Foundation (BWF), is preparing for the challenging NEET exams. Born on March 7, 2005, in the border town of Keran Kupwara, Rabia's life took a drastic turn when her father passed away on January 10, 2006. The aftermath of her father's death saw Rabia's family displaced by the government due to cross-border shelling. Their home shattered by the blasts, Rabia, along with her three siblings and mother, sought refuge in a camp at Keran. However, faced with numerous challenges, including education and shelter, they found themselves homeless.

In 2006, Rabia's journey led her to Sulkoat, where Adhik bhaiya welcomed her and her elder sister Musharraf Mir into the nurturing embrace of BWF Kupwara home. From an infant of one and a half years to a student in a nearby private school, Rabia's life transformed. Surrounded by love and care, she considers herself blessed.

With aspirations to become a doctor, Rabia's journey with BWF expanded beyond academics. She embarked on tours to Mumbai and Karnataka, participated in vocational training, including computer classes and sewing, and engaged in life camps. BWF became a source of motivation and understanding of life's true meaning.

Initially daunted by the Urdu-speaking Adhik bhaiya, Shahida gradually embraced an environment that reshaped her outlook. BWF became a sanctuary, instilling values of discipline, manners, and the profound impact of giving. Shedding the label of an orphan, Shahida aspired to become a doctor, driven by the goal of supporting her family and extending aid to others.

Her gratitude expressed through actions rather than words, Shahida aims to represent India, especially Kashmir, as a symbol of the transformative influence of love and support.

This annual report serves as a testament to stories like Rabia's and Shahida's, where BWF weaves threads of resilience, empowerment, and dreams.

I am thrilled to present to you the Borderless World Foundation Annual Report, for the period 2023-2024. As we navigate through the accomplishments and trials of the past year, I extend my deepest gratitude for your continued support and unwavering commitment to our shared mission. Since our establishment in 1997, the Borderless World Foundation has been at the forefront of peacebuilding, community upliftment, and national inclusion, leaving a lasting impact on the communities we serve.

The region of Jammu & Kashmir stands as one of the world's most severely affected conflict areas, leaving an indelible mark on the lives of its children. Girls, in particular, bear the brunt of the situation, often becoming victims of child marriage and other atrocities. Recognizing this vulnerability, BWF has undertaken a dedicated mission to empower the girl children in the area, striving daily to make Kashmir a better place through initiatives focused on education, peace, and healthcare.

The support of local communities has allowed us to take significant steps forward. We now have the privilege of taking girls to other states for higher studies, empowering them to take steps towards independent lives. Since 2008, we have been organizing regular "Educational and Culture Tours" during the winter break, providing opportunities for exposure, learning, and cultural exchange.

This period allows the girls to interact with children from other institutions, learn vocational skills, participate in workshops, and experience diverse cultures and activities.

In addition to our focus on education, BWF actively supports girls in higher education and vocational training. Over 25 girls are pursuing various vocational courses, as well as graduate and postgraduate career courses in diverse fields such as medicine, engineering, computer science, and nursing. Our commitment to their growth extends to bringing educators from other states to our homes in Kashmir, contributing to their educational and personal development.

Over the last two years, we have expanded our expertise into areas such as health. Projects like "Kashmir Lifeline" and "Jammu Lifeline" serve as emergency medical services i.e providing ambulances to District Health and Administration for operations, as well as organizing medical camps across the state.

Our primary focus, remains on educating children to make them independent and self-reliant, ultimately molding them into responsible citizens—or as we call them “peace angels” of their local communities.

Recently, we achieved a significant milestone with the construction of our own hostel building, "Balika Ashram," in Jammu, serving as a pilot program for future endeavors. We have acquired land in Kupwara

and Budgam, with plans to establish self-owned homes in Srinagar and Anantnag. To achieve these aspirations, we are actively seeking long-term supporters who share our vision and mission.

The expansion of our reach includes homes in Northern (Kupwara), Central (Budgam), Chandpora (Srinagar City), and Southern Kashmir (Anantnag). Additionally, a shelter home in Jammu focuses specifically on the affected girl children of displaced families in refugee camps. Despite the initial challenges in gaining the trust of local communities, our crystal-clear goals and persistent efforts have resulted in the community's acceptance and support.

In closing, I earnestly request your benevolent assistance in fulfilling our mission. Your support is integral to our ongoing efforts, and together, we can continue to make a meaningful impact on the lives of those we serve.

INTRODUCING

Adhik Kadam

Adhik Kadam is an Indian social entrepreneur and philanthropist focused on peacebuilding in Jammu and Kashmir. He holds a master's in political science and co-founded the Borderless World Foundation. Kadam began his career as a volunteer for various nonprofits, visiting Kashmir in 1997 and observing conditions in a Kashmiri Pandit refugee camp at 19.

He actively contributed during the Kargil War, helping displaced refugees. Working with notable figures and organizations, including a project sponsored by UNICEF, he aimed to support children affected by armed conflict in the region.

In 2002, with Bharati Mamani and Mohiuddin Mir, Kadam established BWF to support orphans, focusing on education and basic needs under the "Basera-e-Tabassum" project. Despite challenges, including Mir's murder by militants in 2005, BWF has grown to support over 220 girls across four centers, with the potential to aid over 1000 in Jammu and Kashmir.

Kadam has opened several group homes for war orphans, focusing on girls as the most vulnerable group. Despite being kidnapped by militants and detained by security forces, he remains dedicated to his mission. Living a minimalist lifestyle, Kadam views his work as a spiritual journey, dedicating his life to serving those affected by conflict.

In 1997, a group of compassionate souls embarked on a journey in Jammu and Kashmir. This journey birthed the Borderless World Foundation (BWF), a sanctuary of hope in the shadows of conflict. BWF operates in a region of India that shares borders with Pakistan and China, where peacekeeping is both a challenge and a duty. Borderless World Foundation (BWF) is a Pune-based non-profit organization officially registered under the Indian Societies Registration Act, 1860, in 2002.

It is not merely an organization; it is a testament towards the unwavering spirit of peacebuilding and an inclusive nation. At its very core, BWF's work is driven by empathy, community building, and resilience. BWF's commitment to inclusion goes beyond peacebuilding in borders - we work in a wide range of domains including rescue missions, providing safe housing, delivering essential healthcare, offering quality education, and supporting rehabilitation efforts.

What amplifies BWF's impact is the commitment of dedicated volunteers, serving as trustees and advisory board members. Together, we uphold a model of community building, mobilization, and inclusion. In

the heartland of conflict, the Borderless World Foundation is a beacon of hope illuminating the enduring power of compassion, community building, and the unyielding pursuit of peace and inclusion.

The organization's core areas of intervention include rescue, housing, healthcare, education, and rehabilitation for the girl children of Jammu & Kashmir. BWF has garnered invaluable support from dedicated volunteers, who have served as trustees & advisory board members before. They have also contributed significantly to mobilization and relief initiatives. The organization holds formal registrations including certifications for 80G, 12A, and FCRA, reinforcing its commitment to transparent and

impactful operations.

BWF has been working in strife-ridden J&K since the 1990s, for the socio-economic empowerment of the poor and destitute, especially girl-children. The foundation strives for the motto 'One Great Human Family' and sets forth to the betterment of the affected population irrespective of caste, creed and political persuasion. The BWF family, while adhering to values of compassion and human dignity, continues to move forward with a 'Change-begins-with-me' approach for this social cause.

OUR VISION

To create a brighter, more peaceful future for all communities impacted by conflict through comprehensive socio-economic and educational initiatives.

Our vision encapsulates peace building, through 'peace angels', and national integration of people from Jammu and Kashmir who were left behind in the overall welfare of the country. We envisage a Kashmir with enriched social structure which can lay the foundation for socio-cultural proximity in the community. As an organization, we find it vital to intervene and aim at furthering our efforts towards physical, psychological and social reintegration of conflict-affected women & children by aiding their inclusion in holistic development of the communities. This will ultimately provide a better living environment in terms of education, healthcare and rural development in such arduous situations.

Education

Empowering through education, we provide quality learning to orphaned girls and marginalized individuals, breaking cycles of poverty and shaping destinies.

Economic Empowerment

Transforming lives through economic empowerment. Hence, we provide training to foster independence through sustainable income and revitalize local economies.

HOLISTIC RECOVERY & REINTEGRATION

1. Establishing Safe Havens

Project BeT (Basera-e-Tabassum)

In 2002, amidst Kashmir's unrest, BWF launched Basera-e-Tabassum, translating to 'abode of smiles.' **Dedicated to empowering orphaned girls**, Basera-e-Tabassum offers shelter, security, healthcare, and education, with the goal of empowering them to become resilient individuals rooted in humane values, ethics, and identity. As of today, BWF operates four homes, each catering to about 30-35 children, across

Kupwara, Anantnag, Beerwah, and Srinagar, each meticulously managed by dedicated professionals.

Equipped Facilities: The homes established by BWF are equipped with essential amenities, including computers and manicured lawns, providing a safe and conducive environment for the girls' overall well-being and recreational activities.

Skill Development and Education: In addition to providing shelter and security, BWF places significant emphasis on skill development and education. Through vocational training programs and academic support, the foundation prepares the girls for self-reliance, entrepreneurship, and academic pursuits.


Impact Created: These professionals, also known as Project Coordinators, oversee the operation, ensuring tangible impacts for approximately 30-35 children in each home, fostering an environment of nurturing growth and development.

Project FAH: Facilitate and Accomplish with Humility

IN 2009, BWF initiated 'Project FAH' to create a secure refuge for girls from displaced Kashmiri Hindu families in migrant camps. The project aims to foster confidence among these young girls while equipping them to face life's challenges. Project FAH facilitates overall growth of women in the community, while addressing nearly three decades of mental distress

and insecurity. The project, which started in a rental space, has now grown in folds to achieve a significant milestone by moving into its dedicated home, "Balika Ashram." The "Balika Ashram" pilot project hostel construction in Jammu is almost done, creating a caring space for children's growth. The focus here is on positivity, offering security, sustenance, and education. BWF recognizes the importance of holistic development, encompassing physical health, talents, hobbies, and personality growth alongside academics. This project prioritizes cultivation of a robust cultural foundation among girl students. The holistic approach employed includes - regular medical checkup, physical fitness, career counseling, sports and more. This approach enabled children to foster their innate talents, ultimately equipping them for a promising future.

Impact Created: With FAH, BWF has been able to look after and support over 500 girls complete their education, and also apply for scholarships, higher education etc.

2. Empowering Through Education

Education stands as a beacon of hope, and at Borderless World Foundation (BWF), it's our steadfast commitment. We prioritize providing quality education to orphaned girls and marginalized individuals, recognizing it as a cornerstone for breaking cycles of poverty and shaping destinies.

Educational Support for Girls

BWF proudly supports approximately 30 talented girls from Jammu and Kashmir in pursuing higher education across various fields such as Engineering, Medical Sciences, Animation, Health Administration, MBA, and Social Sciences.

Recent achievements include four girls completing an 18-month Computer Application certificate course in Event Management, two girls achieving BHMS, one obtaining a Master's in Health Administration, and one girl aspiring to become a Chartered Accountant,

with others preparing for NEET and GATE exams.

Girls are based in cities like Kanyakumari, Bangalore, Nasik, Pune, and Chandigarh, representing diverse pathways to success through education.

Bridging the Gap in Education

E-Learning Project: In response to the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic and frequent school closures in Kashmir, the Borderless World Foundation (BWF) launched an E-Learning Project. Our goal was to make education accessible for all children in the Valley.

Led by Project Director Mr. Sudhanshu Gore, this initiative made significant strides during a successful implementation trip to Kashmir in September 2022. With the generous support of Rotary clubs, two sets of e-learning gadgets were introduced, revolutionizing education delivery. These gadgets were deployed for demonstration and designated for Army Goodwill Schools at Dawar and T-Suntwari sectors.

Demonstrations and engagements with education authorities, including Mr. Ghulam War and Mr. A. H. Fani, facilitated the successful implementation of the project.

Educational and Cultural Immersion

Educational Empowerment Trip 2023: Expanding Horizons, the Educational Trip 2023 exposed girls to experiential learning in Srinagar, Mumbai, and Pune, fostering holistic development and broadening horizons. Visits to historical monuments, educational institutions, and modern industries provided invaluable insights and memorable experiences. Notable visits included Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaja Palace, Kaneri Math, Ambabai Temple, Panhala Fort, Morde Foods, and Galaxy Super Speciality Eye Hospital.

Educational and Cultural Immersion: Nurturing Growth. Cultural immersion activities included visits to Sahyadri School in Rajgurunagar, Lion's Club in Chakan, and Rotary Club conferences in Nanded City and metro stations.

Adventures like climbing sports at Ileseum Club in Pune and visits to Imagica amusement park fostered camaraderie and personal growth.

Journey to Mumbai: Embracing Diversity. The journey culminated in Mumbai, where girls explored landmarks like Haji Ali Dargah, Kotak Mahindra Bank, Dhirubhai Ambani Square, and Fountain of Joy, enriching their understanding of culture and contemporary society.

Empowering Through Engagement: Community Initiatives. BWF remains actively engaged in community initiatives, including health camps, children's health check-ups, and celebrations like "Azadika Amrit Mohtsav" near Dal Lake. Noteworthy events include inaugurating Gurez MMU Ambulance and sponsoring a Kashmiri girls' cricket team in the Bikaner Open Women T20 championship.

3. Medical Services

We facilitate the provision of primary healthcare delivery and responsive emergency services. By ensuring accessible medical care, equipped ambulances, and medical camps, we address immediate health needs and promote healthier communities

Medical Camps

Borderless World Foundation (BWF) conducts vital medical camps, bringing healthcare directly to remote regions. These camps are lifelines for communities, providing immediate assistance to those in need.

Srinagar, Gurej, and Ladakh (Sept 2022): Serving approximately 6,500 patients, these camps offer a beacon of hope in regions often overlooked by mainstream healthcare.

Punchh area of Jammu (Oct 2022): With around 700 patients receiving daily aid, these camps not only heal bodies but also uplift spirits, leaving a lasting impression on the community.

North East Sector at Tinsukhiya (Dec 2022):

Mobilizing 20 dedicated doctors, this camp represents a collaborative effort to extend the healing touch to the remotest corners, forging bonds of compassion and care.

Jammu Kashmir Life Line Project

BWF's fleet of 22 ambulances acts as a crucial lifeline for underserved communities. These ambulances, often the only link to medical assistance, have made a profound impact.

Locations Served: From the bustling city streets to the far-flung valleys, these ambulances traverse treacherous terrain to reach those in need.

Beneficiaries: The elderly, children, and vulnerable populations rely on these ambulances for urgent medical care, saving lives and restoring hope.

SBI Sanjeevani – Clinic on Wheels

With 22 ambulances deployed, BWF's Clinic on Wheels initiative has revolutionized healthcare access in remote regions.

Remote Regions Served: From the snow-capped mountains to the remote valleys, these ambulances are a beacon of hope, offering timely medical intervention where none existed before.

Impact: Families breathe easier knowing that medical assistance is just a call away, fostering a sense of security and well-being in communities long neglected by traditional healthcare systems.

Mobile Outreach Primary Diagnosis (MOPD)

BWF's doorstep medical services are a lifeline for communities grappling with health challenges. These services have brought about transformative change.

Community Empowerment: By addressing diverse health concerns directly in villages, BWF empowers communities to take charge of their health and well-being.

Preventive Healthcare: Early detection and intervention for conditions such as hypertension, respiratory infections, and nutritional deficiencies are saving lives and preventing long-term health complications.

Awareness Sessions

BWF's awareness sessions are more than just educational endeavors—they are catalysts for change, igniting a spark of health consciousness in communities.

Behavioral Change: From improved hygiene practices to healthier lifestyle choices, these sessions are sowing the seeds of lasting change, transforming

mindsets and habits.

Community Engagement: By actively involving communities in health promotion, BWF fosters a sense of ownership and collective responsibility, laying the foundation for healthier, more resilient societies.

Specialized Health Camps

Collaborative efforts in organizing specialized health camps have yielded remarkable results, bringing specialized care to the doorstep. Notable impacts include:

Access to Specialized Care: Vulnerable populations, often marginalized and overlooked, receive specialized care for conditions such as gynecological issues, orthopedic ailments, and dermatological concerns.

Empowerment Through Health: These camps not only provide treatment but also empower individuals with knowledge, equipping them to make informed decisions about their health and well-being.

Govt./SBI/SBIF/NGO Officials Visit

Visits by government officials, financial institution

representatives, and NGO stakeholders underscore the significance of BWF's work. These visits serve as testimonials to the transformative impact of BWF's initiatives.

In Kashmir we face lot of problems in attending the offline classes because of the tense situations but because of the computer facilities we were relaxed to a large extent. So thanks to the Borderless World Foundation who is supporting us in every manner no matter what, and is always treating us like their kids.

I can never forget the efforts of borderless which they put on us in building our carrier and always guiding us to the right path. It means a lot so thank you so much to Adhik bhaiya and to every supporter who are supporting us and giving us the bright future. Will certainly make you proud Inshallah.

Kausar




